
## TAILGATING

#### 39th IBEW International Convention

First I would like to say thank you to all my brothers and sisters for giving me the opportunity to attend the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and 39<sup>th</sup> International Convention in St. Louis, it was truly an honor to serve Local 204 as a delegate at this Convention and an experience I will not forget.

125 years ago in a St. Louis boarding room above a dance hall, what we now know as the IBEW was formed from 10 delegates representing 286 members. Due to Local 1's efforts and contributions from many Locals including Local 204 you can visit the Henry Miller Museum the site where it all started. Local 1 has done an impressive job displaying our history and preserving this site for future IBEW members to visit, this was one of my favorite activities on this trip and a place I recommend everyone visit. The Convention started Monday September 19<sup>th</sup> where 2000 Delegates from almost 700 locals representing 632,015 members, unanimously elected IBEW's 17<sup>th</sup> International President Lonnie R. Stephenson, International Secretary-Treasurer Salvatore "Sam" Chilia, and reelected Local 3 Business Manager Christopher Erikson as chairman of the International Executive Council. Throughout the week we would vote on various resolutions and changes to the constitution, where there was spirited debate on several subjects. We would hear from various speakers with a common theme to their stories, we need to continue fighting for equality, dignity, the right to organize, the need to speak with one voice, to remember our past as we fight to preserve our future. Although we were there to work we also took time out to have a little fun and meet new people. There was a picnic and a concert by the Steve Miller Band, and an entertainment night in Ball Park Village next to Busch Stadium. These where excellent opportunities to get to know people and enjoy yourself. The Convention concluded on Friday, September 23<sup>rd</sup>.

I want to thank you all again for sending me to St. Louis for the 39<sup>th</sup> International Convention we have come a long way in 125 years. I leave you with this thought and something I felt while among the almost

5000 IBEW delegates, guests and family members. If we all stick together there is nothing that we cannot accomplish. There is a reason we call each other brother and sister, we are a family, a group of people that is devoted to the betterment of all in the family. I am proud to call myself an IBEW member and even more proud to call you my brothers and sisters.

#### Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993

Many of you may have not had to use the Family and Medical Leave Act, but those of us that have; we thank the Legislators and President that made this great bill become law. The FMLA act started out as H.R.1 introduced by Congressman William D. Ford (D-MI) on 1-5-93, the bill passed the House on 2-3-93, and was passed in the Senate on 2-4-93, and was signed into law by President Bill Clinton on 2-5-93.

The FMLA Act of 1993 is a federal law requiring covered employers to provide employees job protected, unpaid leave for qualified medical and family reasons. Eligible employees can take up to 12 work weeks of time off in any 12-month period to attend to the serious health condition of the employee, parent, spouse or child, or for pregnancy or care of a newborn child, or for adoption or foster care of a child. So no longer do you need to choose between losing your job, or taking care of a loved one.

And yes it is an election year, and yes politics does affect your life so here is a breakdown of how those original votes were tallied. In the House, 265 yes and 163 no, of those, 224 Democrats, 40 Republicans, and 1 Independent voted yes. The no's were 124 Republicans, and 29 Democrats. In the Senate, 71 yes, and 27 no, 57 Democrats and 14 Republicans voted yes. Of the no's there were 25 Republicans, and 2 Democrats. Our longtime Iowa Senator Chuck Grassley, sad to say, was one of those No's.

So brothers and sisters educate yourselves on what really matters for you and your family, look up the voting records of the people that want to make the laws that you will live under, and get out there and do your duty and vote this year!


