
# TAILGATING

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February is recognized as "Black History Month." This celebration has taken place each February since 1926. African-American scholar Dr. Carter Godwin Woodson, along with a group of white scholars, began the push in 1926 with the induction of Negro History Week to insure that the contributions of African Americans to American History were recognized.

It was once legal to discriminate against minorities in hiring and wage equity. Even when it became illegal to discriminate against minorities in the workplace, bias against minorities was widely practiced and tolerated. Unions were at the forefront of the fight for equal wages and an equal chance at jobs that could elevate families out of poverty.

African Americans have played a vital role in labor's history in America as well. In 1869 the Colored National Labor Union was formed. This was the first national black labor organization, with Isaac Myers leading the way. Myers became an apprentice caulker for the clipper ships coming into Baltimore harbor. Under the leadership shown by Myers, the National Labor Union opened its conference to persons of all color in 1869. Myers was invited to speak at that convention, and was one of nine blacks that attended their convention.

Historically, African-Americans were given the least desirable jobs, if they were permitted to work at all alongside whites. In his 1961 speech to the AFL-CIO convention, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "The two most dynamic and cohesive liberal forces in the country are the labor movement and the Negro freedom movement." It is important to remember the historical importance of organized labor to Black workers and their families, and unionism's continued relevance today. As we commemorate Black History Month in 2020, let us not only remember how far we have come but also keep in mind that our hard-won victories still need protection today.

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### **Negotiations Updates**

Linn County Sheriff Sergeants negotiations are complete and we are awaiting Linn County Board of Supervisor approval so the new contract can be taken to a vote. Linn County Assistant Attorneys negotiations began in December 2019 and are ongoing. Cedar County Deputy Sheriffs began late January 2020 and we are awaiting Cedar County Board of Supervisor approval for a vote. ULCS, Windstream, Black Hills Energy, Alliant IES (Large Group) all will begin this spring and summer.
